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Teachers face the writing of objective tests and questionnaires throughout the year. The main types of objective questions teachers often choose to include are multiple choice, matching, true-false, and blank padding. Most teachers try to get a combination of these types of questions to better cover the goals that were part of the lesson plan. Blank fill questions are a common type of question because of their ease of creation and usefulness in classes throughout the curriculum. They are considered an objective question because there is only one possible answer that is correct. who (is) what (is) when (did) where (did) These stems are typically used to measure a wide variety of relatively simple skills and specific knowledge. These include: Knowledge of terms Interest of principles, methods or procedures Interest of specific facts This simple interpretation of the data There are a number of advantages to filling in the blank questions. They provide an excellent means of measuring specific knowledge, reduce student guesswork, and force the student to provide the answer. In other words, teachers can get a real idea of what their students really know. These questions work well in a variety of classes. Here are some examples: Math teachers use these questions when they want the student to provide the answer without showing their work. Example: $12 \div 7 = \underline{\hspace{1cm}}$. Teachers of Science and Social Studies can use these questions to easily assess whether students have learned basics. Example: The atomic number of oxygen is $\underline{\hspace{1cm}}$. Language Arts teachers can use these questions to identify quotes, characters, and other basics. Example: I am the pilgrim in Canterbury Tales who was married five times. $\underline{\hspace{1cm}}$. Foreign language teachers find these kinds of questions useful because they allow the teacher to judge not only the student's understanding of a particular word, but also how it should be written. Example: J'ai $\underline{\hspace{1cm}}$ (hungry). Blank fill questions seem fairly easy to create. With these kinds of questions, you don't have to come up with answer choice options as you do for multiple choice questions. However, although they may seem easy, keep in mind that there are a number of problems that can arise when creating such questions. Here are some tips and suggestions you can use when writing these questions for class evaluations. Use only blank fill questions to test main points, not specific details. Indicate the expected units and degree of accuracy. For example, in a mathematical question whose answer is a number of decimal places, be sure to say how many decimal places you want the student to include. Skip only keywords. Avoid too many white spaces on an element. It is best to have only one or two blanks for students to fill in per question. When possible, place blanks near the end of the item. Do not provide tracks by adjusting the length of white space or the number of white spaces. When you have building the evaluation, be sure to take the evaluation yourself. That will help you be sure that each question has only one possible answer. This is a common mistake that often leads to additional work on your part. There are a number of limitations teachers need to understand when using blank fill questions. They are deficient in measuring complex learning tasks. Instead, they are typically used for general knowledge questions at the lowest levels of Bloom's taxonomy. They should be written very specifically and carefully (as with all elements). A word bank can provide accurate information as well as an evaluation without a word bank. Students who are poorly spellers may experience problems. It is important that you decide whether that spelling will count against the student and whether it is so for how many points. Don't answer a question until you've read it to the end. Always ask the easiest and most obvious questions first. Pay attention to the question language (verb tense) as a clue. Step attention to a word bank (if one is provided) and use the Delete Process. Learn after each answer to make sure it sounds good. By Peter Franczyk Document sometimes have blanks that need to be filled. Some paper documents still require you to fill in the blanks by hand. As the Internal Revenue Service points out in its instructions for Form 1099, although handwritten forms are acceptable, they must be fully readable and accurate to avoid processing errors. Therefore, you can be safer if you scan the document and fill in the blanks using your computer to avoid any misinterpretation. Scan the document on your computer according to your scanner's instructions as an image format such as JPEG or TIFF. If your scanner only scans to Adobe PDF format, convert it simply by scanning the document to PDF, open the PDF, and use the Save As feature to save it as JPEG or TIFF. Open the scanned document image with Microsoft Paint and locate one of the blanks you want to fill in. You can use the scroll bars to scroll through the document and the zoom button to focus on the blank fields. Select the Text button on the Paint toolbar, then click and hold the left mouse button in the blank field where you want to enter information. Move the mouse to resize the text box so that it is large enough to contain the information you want to enter and release the mouse button. If you are not satisfied with the position of the text box, click and hold one of the edges of the box and drag it to a more desirable position. Click inside the text box with the left mouse and start typing the desired text. Change the font or font size of what you are typing or typed using the drop-down menus on the Text toolbar as you would in a word processing document. But this kind of question doesn't have to give you an immediate brain drain. There is an effective strategy to prepare for such test questions. In most cases, the best tool for preparing tests is the big class notes. When you take good grades from your teacher's lecture, you usually have about 85% of the material you'll need to prepare for any type of test, by hand. Most teachers create tests directly from their class notes. As you prepare for a fill test, class notes are even more important than ever. If you have been able to record your teacher's notes word by word, you may have some fill phrases for testing right in front of you. If you're preparing for a blank fill test right now, extract those class notes and try one of these two study strategies. The good thing about this method is that it really prepares you for all kinds of questions. You'll find this method easier to answer most essay questions as well as fillers. Read the class notes and underline new terms, important dates, notable phrases, and the names of key people. Place parentheses around the sentence that contains your keyword or phrase. Copy each sentence to a clean sheet of paper, leaving out the key word or phrase. Leave a blank space where key words or phrases should go. At the bottom of the paper that contains your sentence (or on a separate page), list the keywords and keywords. This will serve as your key. Read your prayers and try to fill in the blanks with correct answers in a very light pencil. Check your notes when needed. Delete your work and continue this process until you can answer all your fill questions with ease. For insurance, read the relevant chapters in your text to find any words or phrases you haven't found in your notes. Make a photocopy of your class notes or textbook pages. Target keywords, dates, and key definitions. Slide the new blank page into a plastic sheet protector.
